Thomas Jones Covid Risk assessment – January 2022
The government continues to manage the risk of serious illness from the spread of the virus. The Prime Minister announced on 27 November the temporary introduction of new measures as a result of the Omicron variant and on 8 December that Plan B, set out in the autumn and winter plan 2021, was being enacted. As a result, these measures are reflected in the guidance for schools published January 2022, which this risk assessment is based on. This advice remains subject to change as the situation develops.

They should not come into school if they have symptoms, have had a positive test result or other reasons requiring them to stay at home due to the risk of them passing on COVID-19 (for example, they are required to quarantine).  If anyone in your school develops COVID-19 symptoms, however mild, they will be sent home and they will follow public health advice.  For everyone with symptoms, they should avoid using public transport and, wherever possible, be collected by a member of their family or household.  If a pupil is awaiting collection, they will be left in a room on their own if possible and safe to do so. A window should be opened for fresh air ventilation if possible. Daily testing of close contacts applies to all contacts who are:  • fully vaccinated adults – people who have had 2 doses of an approved vaccine • all children and young people aged 5 to 18 years and 6 months, regardless of their vaccination status • people who are not able to get vaccinated for medical reasons • people taking part, or have taken part, in an approved clinical trial for a COVID-19 vaccine	Un-vaccinated staff as well as vaccinated staff should be clear on new protocols.
		Children under 5 years are exempt from self-isolation and do not need to take part in daily testing of close contacts.  Pupils with SEND identified as close contacts should be supported by their school and their families to agree the most appropriate route for testing including, where appropriate, additional support to assist swabbing. 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		Safe disposal of any PPE and areas occupied and equipment used by the affected person cleaned and disinfected  Remote Learning - Not all people with COVID have symptoms. Where appropriate, we will support those who need to self-isolate because they have tested positive to work or learn from home if they are well enough to do so. We will maintain our capacity to deliver high-quality remote education for the next academic year, including for pupils who are abroad, and facing challenges to return due to COVID-19 travel restrictions, for the period they are abroad. The remote education provided will be equivalent in length to the core teaching pupils would receive in school. We will work collaboratively with families and put in place reasonable adjustments so that pupils with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) can successfully access remote education. Full expectations for remote education, support and resources can be found on the get help with remote education service.  Confirmatory PCR tests Staff and children with a positive LFD test result should self-isolate in line with the stay at home guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection. They will also need to get a free PCR test to check if they have COVID-19.  Whilst awaiting the PCR result, the individual should continue to self-isolate.  If the PCR test is taken within 2 days of the positive lateral flow test, and is negative, it overrides the self-test LFD test and the pupil can return to school, as long as the individual doesn't have COVID-19 symptoms.	
Insufficient number of staff for the number of children attending and/or safety measures being adhered to.		We will:  Audit the health status and availability of every member of staff and regularly review and update this, so that deployment can be planned.  Carry out individual staff risk assessments where appropriate.  Make full use of all qualified teachers and take a flexible and responsive approach to the use of teaching assistants and pastoral staff in supervising classes.	School contingency plan to be enacted if some or all children have to learn at home.

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		Ensure there are sufficient support staff available to support those children who need a high level of support, including those with SEND whilst minimising changes in contact. Some children, for example those children with ASD will need to be supported by the same adults, where possible. Complete individual risk assessments for children with an EHCP.	
Children and staff well-being detrimentally effected by the additional pressures and concerns around COVID 19	Children and staff	Children Some pupils may be experiencing a variety of emotions in response to the Covid pandemic, such as anxiety, stress or low mood.  Staff Governing boards and school leaders should have regard to staff (including the headteacher) work-life balance and wellbeing. Schools should ensure they have explained to all staff the measures they are proposing putting in place and involve all staff in that process.  Schools have a legal obligation to protect their employees, and others, from harm and should continue to assess health and safety risks  Leadership team as well as all colleagues are to ensure that our usual wellbeing policy for colleagues is being adhered to.  Workplace Options remain open and colleagues can seek counselling and the details are in our policy on the website. The service is free and confidential.
