Such topic-based events are so beneficial. Employing technology, including 'Now Press Play', a device with precisely defined sound, can add a visceral dynamic.

Next month, the Year 6 scholars will venture to the William Morris Gallery in Walthamstow. Associated with the 19<sup>th</sup> Century British arts and crafts movement, Morris was a gifted textile designer and poet. His inventive use of pattern in no small part will form the nucleus for this visit, one that will include a print making workshop.
